

Where's the fire and brimstone?

A commentator wrote: "It has become fashionable in some Christian circles to deny the existence of Hell, or the presence of anyone there, but Matthew's Jesus has no such compunctions. He thrice comments on the presence of angels at the judgment (12:41-42, 49-50; 25:31), and the transporting of some of the judged to punishment that is fiery (13:42) and eternal (25:46)."

But Jesus also has no compunctions in affirming that unless we hate and turn our backs on our families, we cannot be a follower of Jesus. "If anyone comes to me without (turning his back on) hating his father and mother, his wife and children, his brothers and sisters, indeed his very self, he cannot be my follower." Luke 14:26-27

Jesus also has no compunctions about saying that it's practically impossible for the wealthy to enter heaven. "How hard it will be for the rich to enter into the kingdom of God! Indeed, it is easier for a camel to go through a needle's eye than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven." Lk18:24-25. If that's the case, we should pray very hard for wealthy people, and we should avoid getting rich ourselves: "Woe to you rich, for your consolation is now. Woe to you who are full, you shall go hungry. Woe to you who laugh now, you shall weep in your grief." Luke 6:24-25

And Jesus says: "If your hand is your difficulty, cut it off! Better for you to enter life maimed than to keep both hands and enter Gehenna with its unquenchable fire. If your foot is your undoing, cut it off! Better for you to enter life crippled than to be thrown into Gehenna with both feet. If your eye is your downfall, tear it out! Better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to be thrown with both eyes into Gehenna." Lk 9:43-48

And "Whenever you give a reception or dinner, do not invite your friends or relatives or wealthy neighbors. They might invite you in return and thus repay you. No, when you have a reception, invite beggars, the crippled, the lame, the blind. You should be pleased that they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid in the resurrection of the just." Luke 14:12-14

As we see in the above quotes, Jesus often used hyperbole, exaggeration, in his teaching. With regard to Jesus' use of parables, the *Jerome Biblical Commentary* explains: "In a parable, the important thing is the lesson of the whole story; details only serve to bring out the main point."

Because the purpose of a parable is to teach one point, the focus is meant to be on that one point, and the details simply "finish out" the story to make that one point. If we sometimes focus on the detail about the "fiery furnace," for example, we miss the lesson, the point which the parable is meant to make.

The point of the parable of the weeds and the wheat is in this: "Do you want <u>us</u> to pull up the weeds?" "No!" Don't you judge. Don't you condemn.

The point of the parable about the Last Judgment is: "Lord, when did we see <u>you</u> and feed, welcome, visit <u>you</u>?" "When you did it for the least ones, you did it for me." The one thing that matters is our love for others, especially those considered to be least important, and all who love others, especially the least ones, are the ones who love God.

Pope Benedict XVI said: "While Catholics believe the Bible is inspired by the Holy Spirit and that it is true, one cannot take individual biblical quotes or passages and say each one is literally true. It is possible to understand the sacred Scriptures as the word of God only by looking at the Bible as a whole. It is not possible to apply the criterion of inspiration or of absolute truth in a mechanical way, extrapolating a single phrase or expression."

We can ask: But doesn't scripture clearly say that the wicked will end up in a fiery hell?

The Church has never declared that any particular person is in hell, or that anybody is in hell.

When Clare Boothe Luce hesitated at becoming a Catholic because she doubted the compatibility of eternal punishment with God's infinite, merciful love, Bishop Fulton J. Sheen persuaded her that there very well might be no one in hell, and he received her into the Church. (Fr. Kenneth Ryan, *Catholic Digest*)


